"Sunshine Everywhere" first reflects our commitment to ensuring that burn survivors and people with facial disfigurement across Taiwan have timely and easy access to our professional services and support. Sunshine already has four service centers in northern, central, southern and eastern Taiwan. Our regional presence was further strengthened in 2010 with the opening of a new service center in the Yunlin-Chiayi region, to provide critical services to oral cancer survivors, and with the expansion of our physical rehabilitation network, with each regional center now having therapists to provide services locally. About Sunshine

Comprehensive approach

Sunshine Social Welfare Foundation is a nonprofit organization established in 1981 with the mission to assist burn survivors and people with facial disfigurement in their physical, psychological and social rehabilitation; and to uphold their human rights and dignity.

We achieve this by providing services to children, youths, adults with facial disfigurement and their families, as well as by carrying out advocacy and prevention campaigns to raise public awareness and change attitudes towards facial disfigurement.

With close to 100 employees, we rely on a multi-disciplinary team composed of social workers, occupational and physical therapists, psychological counselors, vocational counselors and social educators.



Services adapted to specific needs

Sunshine provides services and support to over 1,500 burn survivors and people with facial disfigurement annually. Our clients include:

Burn survivors

Burn injuries not only affect physical functions, but the resulting disfigurement affects a person's self-perception. Sunshine helps by:

- Providing physical rehabilitation services.
- Providing emotional support and counseling to help burn survivors adjust to disfigurement and develop a positive attitude.
- Offering financial aid during the long rehabilitation process.
- Offering short-term housing for burn survivors during their rehabilitation in Taipei.
- Providing school and vocational counseling to help burn survivors return to daily life in the community.

Oral cancer survivors

Taiwan has over 5,000 new cases of oral cancer and over 2,000 related deaths every year. The disease results in loss of function, emotional distress, inability to work and reduced social participation. Sunshine helps by:

- Providing financial aid for nutritional supplements.
- Offering emotional support and counseling to oral cancer survivors and their family.
- Providing physical rehabilitation to improve functions after surgery.
- Providing home wound care to ensure better oral hygiene following surgery.
- Offering vocational counseling to facilitate return to work.
- Organizing activities that encourage social participation.

People with hemangioma

Often dismissed as a birthmark that will disappear with time, hemangioma can lead to serious medical complications. Sunshine helps by:

- Providing medical information to help people with hemangioma and their families make well-informed medical decisions.
- Providing financial aid to cover treatment costs.
- Providing psychological counseling services.
- Organizing support groups.
- Organizing social skills building activities.

People with neurofibromatosis

Neurofibromatosis (NF) is a genetic disorder causing tumors to grow on nerve tissue, producing skin and bone abnormalities. Sunshine helps by:

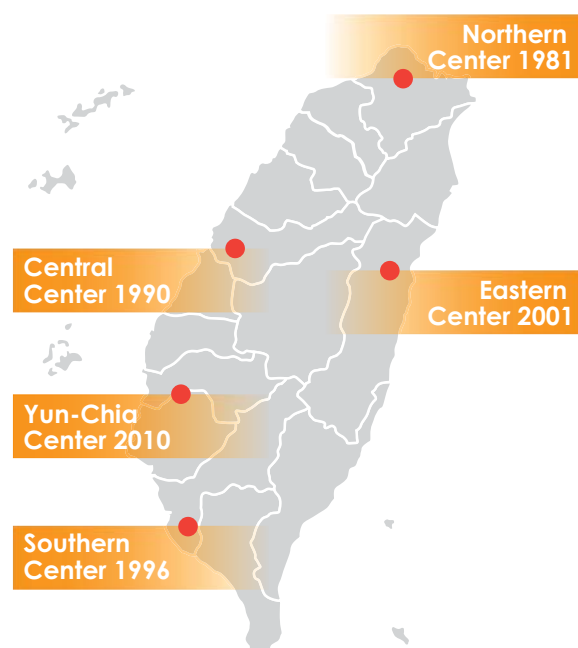
- Providing medical information to help people with NF and their families understand treatment possibilities.
- Providing emotional support and counseling to enhance self-acceptance.
- Providing school and vocational counseling, to facilitate integration of people with NF in their school and at work.
- Supporting the creation of the Taiwan Neurofibromatosis Association.

Sunshine also aims to create an environment where burn survivors and people with facial disfigurement are treated fairly and with respect. By relying on educational activities held across Taiwan and promotion through the media, we not only strive to prevent burns and oral cancer, but also raise awareness about the needs and rights of people with facial disfigurement.

A presence across Taiwan

Despite being small, Taiwan still has its own regional differences and disparities. Medical and social resources available to help people with facial disfigurement vary from one region to the other, so does the public's attitude toward disfigurement. Sunshine has built a service network that now includes five centers across Taiwan. Each center is staffed with social workers coordinating services for clients in their specific district. We are not only closer to people with facial disfigurement and serve them where they live, but are also able to provide services adapted to their regional reality.

Other facilities located in Taipei include a center for the physical rehabilitation of burn survivors and oral cancer survivors, as well as a halfway house providing accommodation for burn survivors during their rehabilitation period in Taipei.



Insuring a Better Life Quality

Physical Rehabilitation and Nursing Care

Whether disfigurement is caused by a disease like oral cancer or an accident like burns, it often has serious physical implications, such as pain, discomfort and loss of functions. Helping improve the physical functions of burn survivors and oral cancer survivors is an important step toward guaranteeing a better quality of life.

In 2010

- Burn rehabilitation: 56 burn survivors underwent rehabilitation at Sunshine Rehabilitation Center in Taipei. Regional centers carried out 349 home rehabilitation visits.
- Oral cancer rehabilitation: Sunshine Rehabilitation Center carried out 244 rehabilitation sessions with oral cancer survivors. Regional centers carried out 453 home rehabilitation visits.
- Oral cancer nursing care: Regional centers carried out 343 visits.

Rehabilitation services for eastern Taiwan

Home rehabilitation services have been available in regions since 2004, first for burn survivors and later for oral cancer survivors. In eastern Taiwan, therapists from Taipei's Rehabilitation Center used to carry out monthly visits but in 2010, Sunshine's Eastern Center gained its own full-time therapist.

The east of Taiwan is one of the most beautiful regions on the island, but it is also one with lower standards of living. Close to 600,000 people (less than 3% of Taiwan's 23 million population) are scattered over a large area, oftentimes in remote mountainous

regions. Limited medical resources, concentrated in the cities of Hualian and Taitung, combined with distance and lack of transportation hinder access to medical care for the population. This is particularly problematic for burn survivors and oral cancer survivors requiring timely physical rehabilitation.

The Eastern Center based in Hualian City is now in a position to bring physical rehabilitation to burn survivors and oral cancer survivors. The therapist and a social worker visit clients in their homes, sometimes driving for as long as four hours. Through frequent visits, the therapist carries out evaluation and plans a rehabilitation program, oversees progress and in the case of burns, supervises pressure garment therapy. He also educates clients and family members about the importance of physical rehabilitation. This is particularly important since in 2010, 39% of burn clients of the Eastern Center were children under 6, and parents' commitment is crucial for compliance with the rehabilitation program.

The therapist's presence also contributes to strengthening relationship with hospital therapists in the regions, as they are the ones able to ensure

that burn survivors and oral cancer survivors benefit from physical therapy early during hospitalization. To this end, Sunshine's therapist is invited to give lectures and share the Foundation's experience.

Frequent home visits make for better follow-up, with problems being caught and addressed early, thus reducing medical complications such as scar contracture, and improving physical functions of oral cancer survivors. But visits also contribute to building stronger ties between the Eastern Center and clients, who feel cared for.

Home nursing services for oral cancer survivors in central Taiwan

In 2006, one year after Sunshine launched its oral cancer program to respond to the continuous increase in oral cancer cases in Taiwan, the Central Center based in Taichung City developed a home nursing service in partnership with local hospitals. The many pressing issues faced by oral cancer survivors during or after cancer treatment are physical in nature (pain, discomfort, inability to eat, fatigue, etc.), and the involvement of a specialized nurse providing care and information is a first step towards helping clients regain a better quality of life.



Our social workers and a nurse, from Chung-Shan Hospital in the beginning of the project and now from Taichung Veterans General Hospital, carry out home visits to help oral cancer survivors and their families address their many physical, emotional and social needs, as well as answer questions about the disease and daily care. The nurse helps clients with problems associated to cancer treatment such as pain, respiratory difficulties or nausea, and helps clients understand the effect of medication they are taking. The nurse also teaches clients and their families how to dress wounds and maintain proper oral hygiene. Visits are also opportunities to monitor health of clients (ex: weight, blood pressure, blood sugar levels) and advise them on ways to maintain good nutrition.

In 2010, 134 clients benefited from the program, with 79% of visits carried out to assist treatment and 17% of visits carried out to help terminally-ill clients requiring hospice care.

This close collaboration between a professional nurse and our social workers has ensured that the needs of oral cancer survivors at the different stage of the disease are addressed in a timely fashion. Visits are also an opportunity to provide emotional support to families, and gain a better understanding of other non-physical issues that will affect clients' recovery: financial problems, employment issues, etc.

Facing the World with Confidence

Psychosocial Services

Disfigurement can result in low self-esteem, poor self-confidence, anxiety in social situations, and sometime more serious conditions like depression. Through emotional support and psychological interventions, social workers and psychological counselors help people with facial disfigurement and their families adjust to disfigurement and develop a positive attitude. However, there are also a wide variety of problems and issues (medical, financial, legal) that can affect a person's journey towards recovering the ability to face the world with confidence. That is why social workers are also there to provide information to clients and their families, and link them to resources.

In 2010

- Social workers provided services to 1,925 clients across Taiwan.
- As part of psychological counseling services, burns support groups totaled 155 attendances. Other group activities such as drama therapy group and relaxation group totaled 143 attendances.
- 97 activities encouraging social participation were held, totaling 2,662 attendances.
- 1,027 subsidies worth NT\$5,874,135 were given, 68.5% of which were for nutritional supplements benefiting oral cancer survivors. Social workers helped clients obtain 72 subsidies from outside resources (government, other NPOs) worth NT\$756,312, 61% of which was for daily living needs. As part of its hemangioma program, Sunshine provided 63 medical subsidies worth NT\$1,008,425.

Reaching out to oral cancer survivors in southern Taiwan

On July 21, 2010, Sunshine Foundation officially opened its fifth regional center in Chiayi City. The Yun-Chia Center provides services in the southern counties of Yunlin and Chiayi, with a special emphasis on oral cancer.

Since launching its oral cancer services and prevention work in 2005, Sunshine has seen a rapid increase in the number of clients with facial disfigurement caused by oral cancer. Yunlin and Chiayi counties both have the unfortunate reputation of being areas where betel nut (the main cause of oral cancer in Taiwan) is produced and widely consumed, resulting in high numbers of oral cancer cases. These are also counties where families subsist on the lowest average income in Taiwan (an average per family of NT\$643,980/year in Yunlin and NT\$655,130/year in Chiayi) (1).

Sunshine established the Yun-Chia Center to provide services and support to oral cancer survivors and their families. Obviously, the disease and resulting disfigurement from treatment seriously affect the physical functions and psychological well-being of oral cancer survivors. However, since the disease mostly touches middle-aged men who are their families' breadwinner, their incapacitation

and resulting loss of income also worsen the already precarious situation of families in the counties. In many cases, oral cancer survivors and their families are unaware that social resources are available or they do not know how to avail themselves of these resources. Furthermore, many oral cancer survivors live in hard to reach rural areas, complicating their access to health services and adequate information on how to properly care for themselves after hospital discharge.

Like other regional centers, the Yun-Chia Center is staffed with social workers who act as caseworkers to coordinate needs assessment, design and monitor individual service plan, as well as link clients to various resources inside and outside the Foundation. Social workers use home visits to connect with clients, understand their needs, build a trusting relationship and follow their progress. Based on a needs assessment, social workers will help arrange visits by physical therapists and nurses to carry out home rehabilitation or nursing services; they will arrange financial aid to support clients and their families during the remission process; they will also organize a variety of activities to foster sharing and peer support among oral cancer survivors.

Yun-Chia Center is still small with three full-time staff, but nonetheless managed to provide services to 114 clients in 2010. Sunshine will continue to deepen its roots in Yunlin and Chiayi, by providing timely services to clients, and by building stronger partnerships with local governments and hospitals. Moreover, Sunshine will continue to develop opportunities for prevention interventions adapted to the socio-economic reality of the region.

Empowering People through Work

Vocational Counseling and Social Enterprises

Work is not merely an economic necessity; it is also a way of fulfilling one's potential and being an active member of society. For people with facial disfigurement, having access to employment can be a challenge. A disabling medical condition (oral cancer) or injury (severe burns) can limit a person's physical ability to work. People able and willing to work are also denied this possibility because of prejudices regarding their appearance. Employment services aim to strengthen work capacities of people with facial disfigurement and develop work opportunities for them.



In 2010

- 89 people benefited from job referral services.
- Vocational counseling services helped 50 new clients.
- 64 people maintained stable employment for over 3 months.
- Social enterprises employed 73 people with disabilities.

Expanding Sunshine's social enterprise network

On October 29, 2010, Sunshine expanded its carwash business employing people with disabilities by opening two new carwash centers in the greater Taipei area, the Guandu and Zhonghe branches.



Sunshine's first carwash center opened in 1992 in a busy area of Taipei City, and has since provided training and employment opportunities to people with disabilities, showcasing their work abilities to the public. Heping Carwash Center employs an average of 100 people with disabilities annually, training future carwash managers and car beauty specialists.

To broaden the scope of its employment services, create opportunities for people with disabilities to earn their own living and promote experienced staff to managerial positions, Sunshine opened new branches in 2010. Smaller in size, Zhonghe branch is closely integrated in the community, allowing employees to familiarize themselves with the various aspects of operations and cultivate skills and knowledge useful for employment in the regular job market, or even for launching their own business. Guandu branch is another model, based on NPO-business partnership. Pegatron Corp, a leading company specialized in electronics, worked with Sunshine to secure an advantageous location, and sponsored construction of facilities and purchase of equipment.

Social enterprises are platforms where employees with special needs, together with consumers and supporters of Sunshine, create social value, and contribute to removing obstacles to the social participation of people with disabilities.

A new vocational service model for clients in central Taiwan

Since starting oral cancer services in 2005, the proportion of oral cancer survivors among clients of Sunshine has grown from 48% in 2006 to 62% in 2010. Many require vocational counseling services, but their background and medical condition often pose a challenge when identifying job opportunities, making it necessary for counselors to show some creativity. This is what the Central Center did in 2010 with its "Sunshine taxi" project.

Oral cancer survivors are for the most part middle-aged men with primary or secondary education, employed in blue collar, labor intensive jobs. Often unable to return to their original occupation, they are disadvantaged in the competitive job market by their age, education and work experience. Furthermore, uncertainties about their physical condition and possible cancer recurrence worry potential employers.

Seeking ways to develop job opportunities suited to the needs of oral cancer survivors, vocational counselors of the Central Center devised in 2010 a project to help clients become taxi operators. Indeed, this business offers independence and flexible work schedules. Furthermore, government guarantees people with disability certificates the possibility to be independent taxi operators.



Between September and December 2010, the Central Center not only held information sessions to familiarize clients with the taxi business, inviting taxi drivers to share their experience, but vocational counselors also helped participants assess their work abilities and interest, as well as guide them through the examination and registration process necessary to obtain a taxi operation license. Of the 12 clients who registered, three obtained their taxi operation license and are currently working part-time or full-time. Another two obtained their operation license and will start work in March 2011, while one client will complete the registration process in early 2011.

The "Sunshine taxi" experiment will be continued in 2011. Faced with limited choices in the regular job market, vocational counselors set out to create employment opportunities for oral cancer survivors that not only fulfill a financial need, but also contribute to strengthening their sense of self-worth and confidence.

Promoting Safe and Accepting Communities

Prevention and Social Education

Taiwan is an open and tolerant society, but despite progress made over the last 30 years, there still remain prejudices against people with facial disfigurement that limit their prospects, making it harder for them to find a job, make friends or just be treated fairly and equally. Through activities in schools and communities, media campaigns and rights advocacy, social education aims to change how people see facial disfigurement.

In 2010

- 94 burn prevention and social acceptance educational activities were attended by 12,596 people.
- 267 oral cancer prevention and social acceptance educational activities were attended by 37,490 people.
- In 2010, Sunshine launched the Face Equality campaign in Taiwan. The concept was originally promoted in the UK by Changing Faces .

Understanding people with facial disfigurement by walking in their shoes

Helping the public better understand facial disfigurement in order to create a friendlier social environment where our clients can be treated equally and with respect is the main goal of Sunshine's social education work. One way social educators in regional

centers have been achieving this is by letting people experience what it feels like to be a burn survivor or an oral cancer survivor.

Social educators of Sunshine have designed educational activities that allow participants to "walk in the shoes" of people with facial disfigurement. After talking about facial disfigurement, and explaining its physical, psychological and social implications, social educators invite participants to experience for a few minutes situations that people with facial disfigurement encounter in their daily life. By using simple accessories, they replicate the difficulties that oral cancer survivors face after operation, like opening one's mouth, eating, talking, etc. Participants experience the impact the disease has on daily life, but also on social interactions. By inviting participants to wear a pressure garment mask and walk around, observing the reaction of people, social educators help people understand how a changed appearance makes you more self-conscious of stares or negative comments, things burn survivors are often subjected to.



It is one thing to hear about the situations faced daily by people with facial disfigurement, but it is another thing to actually go through similar experiences, albeit only for a short period of time. When these educational activities are over, participants usually gain a better understanding of facial disfigurement, and this knowledge based on experience in turn transforms how they will view and interact with people who have facial disfigurement.

Giving Back to Others

Volunteering

Sunshine relies on a team of specialists to provide support to people with facial disfigurement, but they are also helped in their work by volunteers who devote time and energy to assist with administrative tasks, take part in the organization of activities and develop projects. Many of them are people with facial disfigurement who, through giving back and helping their peers, give a new meaning to their experience.

In 2010

- 76 volunteers contributed a total of 7,514 hours of services.

Group activities are important to clients of Sunshine, who find comradeship and expand their support network all while having fun. The Southern Center, based in Kaohsiung City, decided to continue fostering clients' personal growth through group activities by combining volunteering in the Sunshine Electric Company project, started in 2010. A three-year project, the Sunshine Electric Company's concept is to develop the potential of clients so that they "generate power."

In its first year, Sunshine Electric Company recruited a core group of 24 client volunteers to take part in leisure activities such as day trips and movie outings, and to

progressively become involved in planning and organization. In the process, client volunteers built new skills and discovered new talents, they also developed a sense of ownership towards projects. By being part of a group, they met new friends and increased their social interaction skills. By successfully planning and implementing activities, they felt a sense of achievement and their self-confidence was enhanced.

Ideas for activities in 2010 were initially proposed by social workers, and responsibility for organization was progressively devolved to the members. The year culminated with client volunteers successfully organizing the Southern Center's Sunshine Scholarship Awards. In 2011, members will be the ones proposing activities not just for themselves, but for the other clients of the Southern Center. Courses to further develop their potential will be organized and eventually, members will be fully responsible for developing activities, thus fulfilling the ideal of "clients helping clients."

Learning and Sharing with the World

International Exchange

Since 2006, Sunshine Foundation has been actively participating in international conferences as a way to meet with international counterparts, learn about their work and gain new knowledge. These events are also platforms to share our work with others. As we better understand the needs and issues facing people with facial disfigurement in other countries, and as more people become familiar with our work in Taiwan, more opportunities for exchange and cooperation have emerged.

In 2010, following strategic planning, Sunshine made the commitment to progressively develop international cooperation over the next five years, with a special emphasis on capacity building and knowledge transfer. When Sunshine was developing some of its services like pressure garment or skin camouflage, we sought knowledge and techniques abroad. We now hope to play a similar role for organizations that seek to develop their own services for burn survivors and people with facial disfigurement.

In 2010

- Sunshine Foundation welcomed 148 visitors from Macao, Korea, Hong Kong, Japan and China.
- Representatives from Sunshine Foundation took part in the 2010 conference organized by the International Society for Burn Injuries, making presentations on the foundation's latest burn-related services and research.
- Sunshine was invited to present its burn rehabilitation service model during the Burn Symposium organized by Hallym University Hwangang Sacred Heart Hospital in Seoul, Korea.

Bringing Forth Change

Advocacy

Upholding the rights of people with disfigurement is part of Sunshine's mission. An important advocacy effort launched in 2009 and continued in 2010 deals with the impact of the Protection Act for Rights and Interests of (Physically and Mentally) Disabled Citizens, and the proposed implementation of a national ICF-based system for the assessment of disability status and needs. In 2010, Sunshine continued to be actively involved in policy discussions, making sure that the rights and interests of people with facial disfigurement were represented, but also that the spirit of ICF (rights-based and patient-centered) was respected. Furthermore, Sunshine completed the drafting of an ICF core set for burns, and tested its validity by carrying out needs assessment with clients. Sunshine hopes government will adopt this core set as a tool for the assessment of needs of burn survivors. ICF core sets for other forms of disfigurement are currently being developed.

Another important focus of Sunshine's advocacy activities is oral cancer prevention. In December 2010, Sunshine and the Taiwan Alliance for Areca Nut Control and Oral Cancer Prevention unveiled the results of the 2010 National Oral Cancer Prevention Survey which examined the status of oral cancer prevention in Taiwan and selected the five counties or cities with the best track record in this area: Hualian County, Chiayi County, Yunlin County, Taipei County and Taipei City. The goal of the Survey was to recognize the efforts of counties and cities carrying out outstanding oral cancer prevention work, as well as raise public awareness about the disease and the importance of betel nut control.

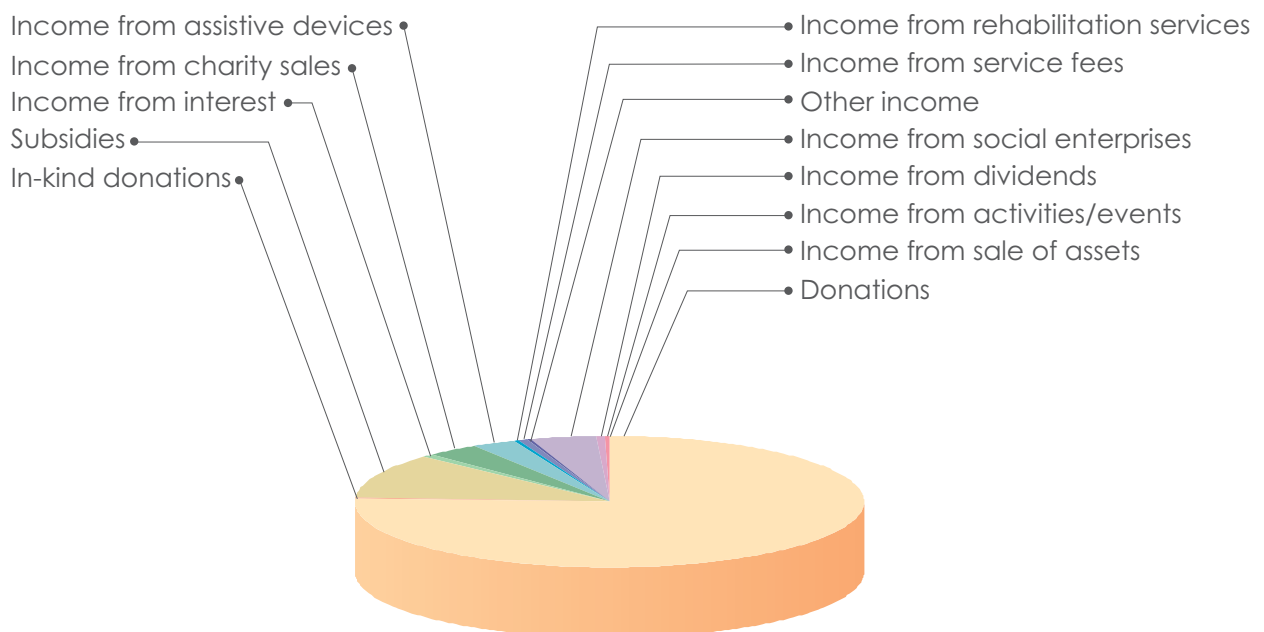

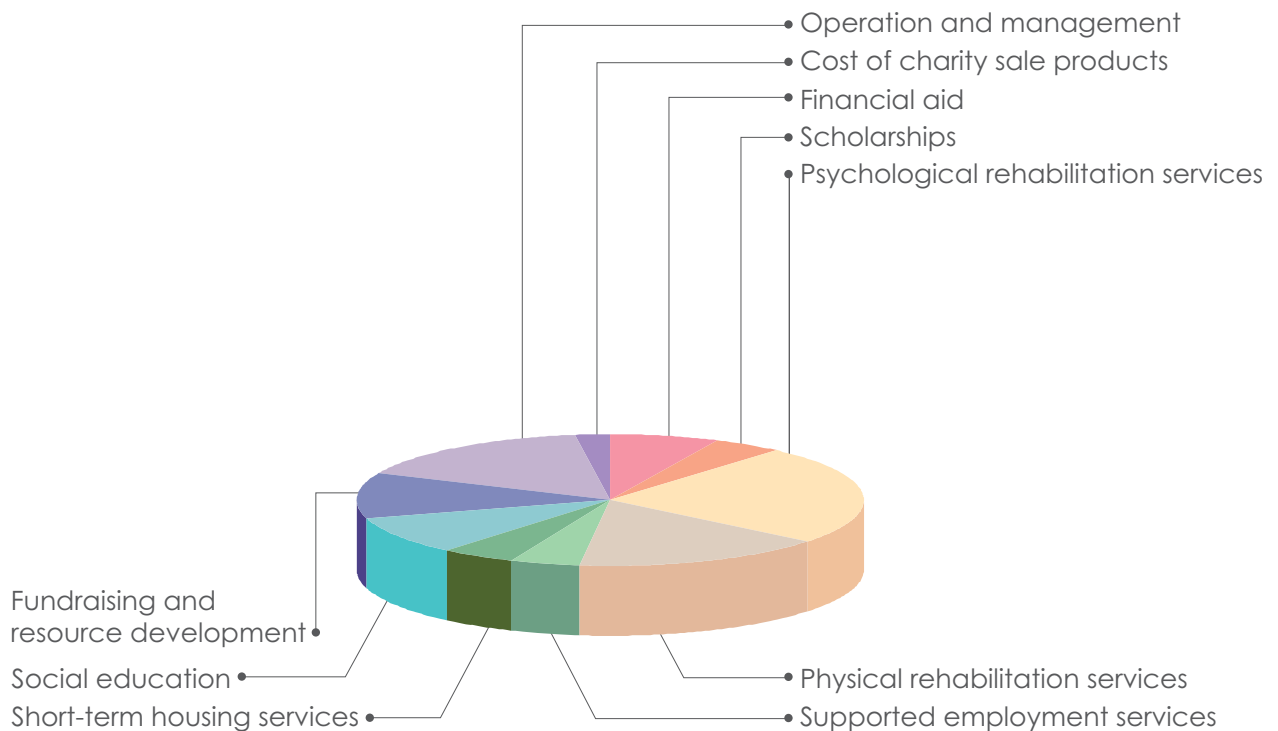
